where she was Convenor of the Planning Committee. In 1998 she founded and became the first chair of the Campaign for Borders Rail (CBR) which campaigned successfully for the reopening of the Borders Railway.



Brian Carroll is the Assistant Secretary General leading the Climate Action and Environment function at the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications. Brian joined the Department in 2008, having worked previously as Head of Decarbonisation and Head of Finance and Corporate Affairs. Oisín was one of the co-founders of the Environmental Pillar in 2009, the

advocacy coalition of national environmental NGOs, and was recently re-elected to the Pillar's steering committee. Before joining Friends of the Earth, Oisín worked for 10 years in the areas of overseas aid and human rights.



Evelyn Cusack is Head of Forecasting at **Met Éireann**. She has been assigned responsibility at Senior Meteorologist level for managing the Forecast Division which incorporates both operational and strategic tasks. The primary responsibility is to ensure resilient 24/7/365 operations in the Central Analysis and Forecast Office and in the Central Aviation Office. These offices also support weather broadcasting on RTÉ radio and television and build and maintain an online presence for Met Éireann.

Critical tasks include the provision of forecast and warnings services to the road maintenance community and the aviation community. Forecast Division provides a high degree of support to Emergency Management in Ireland in both planning and operational phases, and coordinates with the forecast and warning services of other European National Met Services as appropriate.



Chris Elliot is currently Professor of Food Safety and founder of the Institute for Global Food Security at Queen's University Belfast. He served as Prime Minister of the Republic of Togo from 2008 to 2012, where he introduced economic reforms and enhanced the rule of law and civil liberties. From 1996 to 2008, he undertook a number of roles at the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) including Chief of Staff and Assistant Secretary-General, Africa Regional Director, where he led poverty alleviation programmes in 45 countries in sub-Saharan Africa. Prior to this, he spent a decade in the private sector, including sub-salariam Annua. This this, he spent a decade in the physics sector, including at Price Waterhouse, Canada, where he worked in Audit and Financial Advisory Services. Mary Kelly-Quinn is an Associate Professor in the School of Biology and Environmental Science, at the University College Dublin. Her research focuses on assessment of land-use and other anthropogenic activities on the physical, hydrochemical and ecological quality of surface waters with particular reference to multiple stressors and climate change. Some of the key projects completed include HYDROFOR (forest-water interactions), RIVTYPE (characterising reference conditions for Irish rivers and

typological classification) and ESManage (framework for identification and valuation of freshwater ecosystem services). She is currently coordinating three, large-scale, EPA-funded projects with national and international partners; RECONNECT (mapping and assessing barrier impacts on rivers), SSNet (managing the small stream network for improved water quality, biodiversity and ecosystem services protection), ESDecide (freshwater ecosystem services decision support). Further afield she is collaborating with the University of Addis Ababa and in Kenya with the University of Pwani on water quality issues.



Conor Murphy is a Professor in the Department of Geography at Maynooth University. His research interests are interdisciplinary and focus on Hydroclimatology, Historical Climatology and Adaptation to climate change. Conor has been awarded over €5 million in funding as PI or Co-I from National and European sources. His research engages closely with enterprise, public bodies and communities. He has consistently published in top ranking international journals including; Science, Nature, Nature

Climate Change, Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. He has also published numerous book chapters and government reports informing policy in the area. Conor sits on the National Climate Change Adaptation Committee and has acted as expert reviewer for reports of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. From 2014 to 2016 he was a member of the Public Accounts Committee, Committee for Justice and the Committee for Agriculture and Rural Development.
